2020 Tours

The current situation is that we have now cancelled all of our tours up to the end of June 2020. Everyone affected has been contacted personally.

Obviously this is very disappointing for all of us but it is entirely out of our control and is the only sensible course of action.

Our main point of reference in deciding whether to cancel a tour is the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO). Where they advise against travel, then we do not travel.

We also take into account information from our suppliers locally (mainly the ferry companies and the campsites), who let us know the situation on the ground.

One difficulty for us is deciding at which point to cancel a tour. We don't want to do it too early if there is a

chance that the tour may go. Conversely we cannot leave it too late as we have to confirm bookings for the ferries and campsites and we have to take payments from you.

Different countries have taken different approaches to this but almost all of them are on some form of lockdown until June at the earliest.

We do know that many of our campsites across Europe are planning on extending their season up to the end of October. This gives us some scope for putting some extra tours on later in the year all being well.

Therefore, for the remaining tours in August and September we are looking at them on a tour by tour basis. If you are booked on a tour later this year, we will contact you directly as soon as the decision is made.

There are some positive signs at the moment with some countries starting to open up a little, but we will simply have to wait and see how this pans out before making a decision.

2021 Tours

We are very encouraged by the amount of people asking about 2021. It shows that there is a real desire to get back

out there again once we get through the current crisis.

We did release the 2021 previews just prior to the Coronavirus lockdown (great timing), but have currently put everything on hold for 2021.

The 2021 schedule is likely to be a mixture of tours that got cancelled this year and new ones that we planned to do next year. Please keep an eye on the newsletter for the latest information.

Coq au Van: the amusingly titled recipe section

Sausage and Pearl Barley Stew

Ingredients:

- 3 Tbsp of Oil.
- 6 Cumberland Sausages.
- 2 Onions sliced.
- 2 Cleary sticks, halved lengthways and cut into chunks.
- 2 carrots diced. 200 g Pearl barely, rinsed in cold water.

2 sprigs of time, leaves removed.

Approx 200 mil of chicken stock.

Half of Savoy cabbage, salt & pepper.. Salt and Pepper

Cooking method:

Heat 2 the of oil in a large deep frying pan. Add the sausages and cook for 8 - 10 minutes, turning every so often, until golden.remove from pan and set aside.

Add the remaining oil to the pan. Add the onions, celery and carrots and cook gently for 5 - 6 minutes, stirring occasionally until softened.

Stir in the Pearl barley and thyme followed by the stock. Season well. Simmer for 10 minutes, then return the sausages to the pan. Simmer for another 20 minutes.

Add the chopped cabbage and more water, if the liquid level is low. Simmer for another 5 - 10 minutes until the cabbage is cooked. Check the seasoning and serve.
