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Review of the Year

Our touring year started as it always does with our Three-Country Starter Tour. We describe this tour as a bit of Holland, a bit of Belgium and a bit of France.

We actually like the bit of Holland best, so much so that we are planning on doing a full tour there in 2020. That's not to say we don't like the other bits as Bruges and Brussels are two of the prettiest, most accessible cities we visit.

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Next trip for us was the Baltic States. This was our first time with a group and it was simply awesome. It's a bit different from all other tours, partly as you get two mini-cruises (from Kiel to Klaipeda and back) at either end of the tour.

However, the main attraction is just how easy it is to get around the three countries in your motorhome. You can take the van almost everywhere and get parked and with so little traffic, you are free to explore.

The three capitals are perhaps the obvious stand-out attractions although we have a massive soft spot for Rundales Palace where they filmed BBC's War and Peace.

We were also struck by Vilnius's most recent tourist attraction: "The upside down house" (it's



worth Googling), which will live forever in our memory.

Meanwhile over in Germany, Dave and Sue were soaking up the sun on our Rhine & Alsace Tour with a group of Brits who were going to miss two key events. One was the Royal Wedding and the other was England (doing well for a change) in the World Cup. Apologies to our Scottish, Irish and Welsh readers.

Our friendly campsite owner came to the rescue locating the group in the 'satellite' pitches so that a full-on British street party could take place. This tour was also notable as the first ever to include a ladies choir made up from 'Crossings' guests.

It was a quick lay-over for Dave & Sue as they then headed straight off for the Brittany & Normandy Tour.

Despite some of the worst weather of the year albeit just for a couple of days, the group enjoyed a hot and humid couple of weeks at some lovely seaside locations.

There is lots to do in the city, but our stand-out bits were the intact Viking Ship that they pulled out of the fjord and the bustling Aker Brugge area where all the local ferries dock. Then there's the weirdest sculpture park in Europe too.

August is a great time to 'do' Scandinavia as the kids all go back to school early August and it is really quiet on the campsites. Coq au Van: the amusingly-titled recipe feature with ideas for meals that you can cook within the confines of a motorhome!

Epic rib-eye steak

Ingredients:

600g piece of Rib-Eye steak (ideally 5cm thick), fat removed.
4 sprigs of fresh rosemary.

4 cloves of garlic.

350g mixed mushrooms.

1 x 660g jar of white beans

Method:

- 1. Place a large non-stick frying pan on a medium-high heat.
- 2. Rub the steak all over with a pinch of Sea salt and black pepper, then sear on all sides for 10 minutes in total, so you achieve good colour on the outside but keep it medium rare in the middle, or cook to your liking, turning regularly with tongs.

- Meanwhile, strip the rosemary leaves off the sprigs, peel and finely slice the garlic, and tear up any larger mushrooms.
- 4. When the steak is done, remove to a plate and cover with tin foil.
- Reduce the heat under the pan to medium, and crisp up the rosemary for 30 seconds, then add the garlic and mushrooms and cook for 8 minutes., or until golden, tossing regularly.
- 6. Pour in the beans and their juice, add 1 tablespoon of red wine vinegar and simmer for 5 minutes, then season to perfection.
- 7. Sit the steak on top and pour over any resting juices.
- 8. Slice and serve at the table, finishing with a little extra virgin olive oil, if you prefer.



Motorhoming and Travel Tips & Advice

"External silver

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We have recently purchased some silver screens and having gone through the process, here are our tips.

- 1. The paper 'concertina' screens are brilliant for privacy. However, they don't stop condensation and if you have to buy them, they are around £700 fitted.
- 2. Internal thermal screens are OK but they are a slight faff to fit and they have gaps around the edges that let condensation and light in.
- External silver screens seem
 to be the most effective.
 They fit snugly, reduce
 condensation in cold
 weather and keep the cab
 cool in hot weather.
- 4. Some makes now come with a privacy screen, which is like a fine mesh that you can see out of, but not into. Highly

recommended.

- 5. External silver screens are light but bulky so you have to store them somewhere.
- 6. When they get wet, you still have to store them somewhere!
- 7. We bought the "Silverscreens" brand, which we recommend. Other folks have used 'Taylormade' and these also come recommended.
- 8. They seem to last forever so are well worth the £250 you will need to pay new.
